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### Introduction

It is very pleasing to see the Shifnal Town Plan appear in print after eighteen months of hard work by so many people. The plan is derived from the views obtained from residents of Shifnal, and it would not have been possible to develop without the very strong support of the residents, particularly in taking the time to complete the Questionnaire earlier this year.

My job of chairing the Shifnal Town Plan Steering Committee was made easier by the dedication and enthusiasm of its members. In particular, I do wish to record my personal appreciation of the work of Jayne Owen, who acted as co-ordinator for the committee. Without her drive and organisational skills, we should not yet have completed this plan.

It was also very gratifying to see the large number of volunteers who have come forward in response to the Questionnaire, and their efforts will be crucial in putting into effect so many of the projects identified in the Action Plan. The Town Plan Group acknowledges that partnership working between Shropshire Council, Shifnal Town Council, volunteers and other stakeholders is vital to the implementation of the Town Plan.

The following sections summarise the feedback received from the consultation process carried out during 2008. References to the Questionnaire are based on the Residents' Questionnaire, which gained almost a 30% response from residents aged 18 or over. Valuable information was obtained from younger people by a series of Youth Forums, and the use of pod voting sessions with those at primary school. The pupils from Shifnal Primary School and St Andrew's School also contributed the artwork which appears on the covers of the plan and elsewhere.

From all this feedback, an Action Plan has been produced, which has been printed at the end of this document.

### Shifnal Past and Present

Shifnal has a long and interesting history: the Domesday Book of 1086 shows that Shifnal (or Idsall as it was then known) was already a relatively prosperous and well-populated community. Idsall continued to prosper in the Middle Ages and in 1245 a weekly market and yearly fair were established. The main elements of the present street plan were almost certainly established at about this time when a wide market street was added to the older Church Street area. It was this newly laid out street which had the name Shifnal, and until the 18th century the names of Shifnal for the Broadway, Bradford Street and Park Street area, and Idsall for the area round the church and manor house were carefully distinguished.

Until the late 17th century most of the population of Shifnal were involved in agriculture. In the 18th and the beginning of the 19th century the town enjoyed considerable prosperity catering for coaching traffic, although when the railway from Wolverhampton to Shrewsbury was opened in 1849 this rapidly disappeared. The industrial revolution had little effect on Shifnal town which by then had reverted to its earlier character of a small market town serving only local needs. In the 19th century Shifnal, like most towns, saw the proliferation of a whole variety of buildings for community purposes such as a Mechanical Institute offering lectures, a library and reading rooms.

Shifnal changed very little until the 1960's when the present wide shopping area of Bradford Street and Cheapside was opened up and the crowded buildings which had grown up in the original Market Place were cleared. Unfortunately many of the older buildings were demolished at that time but there are still groups of 17th century half-timbered buildings, almost all built after the serious fire which occurred in 1591. There are attractive brick houses of the 18th and 19th centuries, and the church is beautiful and of considerable interest. Much



of the centre of the town is now a Conservation Area. Many new houses have been built in estates around the core of the old town, there is now also some light industry, and the population has more than doubled to nearly 7000 since the 1930's. But in spite of these changes and the great expansion of Telford, Shifnal's surroundings are still largely rural.

Shifnal has kept much of its ancient character as a market town. Although it is not an obvious tourist attraction like Ludlow or Shrewsbury, much of its past can still be traced in the modern town, and its long coaching history has been reflected in recent years by the development of a wide range of restaurants and public houses which attract visitors from the surrounding towns.

Shifnal is a thriving community with a wide range of clubs and societies. The town is twinned with the small French town of Machecoul and annual exchange visits are arranged by the Twinning Association. It has an active civic society, The Shifnal Society, which strives to safeguard the character of the town and prevent unsuitable development.




### **About You**

Questionnaire responses showed a slight feminine majority (56%), but exhibited a stronger interest with increasing age.




There was very strong support for believing that Shifnal is a good place to live, shown by the chart below, and also by the written responses. These particularly highlighted the friendliness of people and the community spirit, as well as the semi-rural location with good access to the countryside. Other written responses again had large numbers of people who identified very positively as good features of the town the range of shops, the range of restaurants and pubs, and transport (especially having a railway station, close access to M54 and other road links, and local transport).

Nevertheless, there were criticisms of these areas. More shops with greater variety and a proper Farmers' Market would be welcomed, and improvements to the railway station are wanted.



Questionnaire responses showed a number of approaches to an aim of attracting more visitors to Shifnal (illustrated below). Additionally, improving shopping as mentioned above would be helpful, as well as improving parking, more flowers and plants, hosting an up-to-date website, running various festivals, and improving the cleanliness and tidiness of streets.






The worst features of living in Shifnal were mainly identified under the following four headings:

- Anti-social behaviour (teenagers hanging around, late-night drinkers, some crime/drugs/vandalism)
- Traffic and transport (lack of car parking, congestion and HGVs, speeding, shabby/dark station, poor bus service in evening, illegal/obstructive parking, problems with pavements and crossings)
- Facilities (nothing for young people, poor shopping facilities, too many pubs/restaurants/takeaways, no swimming pool)
- Townscape (too many flats, overcrowded, ugly, pricey for first-time buyers, unattractive/shabby/dirty town centre, litter, dog fouling)


### Interests, Culture and Leisure

More than 500 people indicated that they would like to see more Adult Education classes in Shifnal. Favourites were computing, languages, crafts and family history, and there was also good support for art & painting classes and for a reading group, as well as for classes in cookery, and photography. Most respondents would prefer classes that do not lead to a qualification. The time of day that classes are held is also important for many people, some preferring daytime classes and others evening sessions.

Most respondents said that they found out about what is happening in Shifnal by word-of-mouth or from local press etc and the town notice boards. Several people indicated that the notice boards were badly sited and not easily accessible by the less mobile. There is very considerable support for a better town website informing people about events.



Over 1000 respondents would like Shifnal to have a Christmas fair, and over 600 a music week and/or an arts & entertainments week.






Many respondents said that they attend clubs and activities in the town, and there are a very large number of these, the favourites being Church activities and The Shifnal Society. Several people highlighted the difficulty in attending clubs and the like through infirmity, age or transport problems and many would like to join in more but have work or other responsibilities. Some people see the present clubs and societies as aimed at the young or the old.

There are also many who would like to see new clubs and activities started up, the favourites being swimming, gardening, dance, keep-fit and music.

There are very mixed views about the entertainment available in Shifnal, with only 383 people – 1 in 3 respondents – saying that it is Good or Very Good. A number of people indicated that events were not well publicised. Many would like to see some bigger events held in the Village Hall, examples being meals, concerts, dances, amateur dramatic shows. Many would like to have more frequent cinema shows.


### **Traffic, Transport and Pedestrian Safety**

Questionnaire responses identified significant concerns about speeding traffic and pedestrian safety both in the town centre and around the schools. Well over 750 voted for 20mph zones in the town centre and around schools.



Community Speed Watch was a great success and may return. Over 300 people were in favour of the scheme, and over 400 wanted to see speed cameras put in place, whilst 765 people would like to see more flashing speed warning signs.

There is great concern and support for better traffic management in the town centre along with more pedestrian crossings. Almost 800 people would like to see more cycle ways, with safe parking places for cycles.






Views were divided on car parking charges, with 617 people wishing to continue to pay a lump sum to Bridgnorth District Council, and 642 in favour of the first 2 hours free, and then pay.


There was little support for the idea of a regular bus service to Priorslee Surgery and the larger supermarkets, and most people said that they would never use a subsidised community bus service.

Over 950 people said that they used trains, either occasionally or at least once a week. Following discussions between the train operators and Shifnal Crime Prevention Panel, new security cameras covering the car park, tunnel and platforms have been installed. The operators have confirmed that it is apparent, from the increased number of parked cars, that there are more people using the station in this safer environment.



### **Crime and Crime Prevention**

Anti-social behaviour is a source of great concern, with major issues being fairly equally divided between speeding traffic, drunkenness, illegal drug use, and vandalism. People who have experienced these types of crime said that drunkenness, speeding traffic, and vandalism came out on top of the list.



There is a strong desire for longer opening hours for Shifnal Police Station, with over 1250 people saying that they would like it open for 8 or more hours each day. In commenting on police coverage of the town, 133 people said it was good, 476 said adequate, and 549 said poor.

Nearly 1000 people were aware that Shifnal had a Neighbourhood Watch (in fact, there are 14 separate Neighbourhood Watch schemes in the town, plus a Rural Watch all working together along with the Shifnal Crime Prevention Panel to reduce crime).




### Healthcare

More than 1000 people (82% of respondents) had seen a doctor in the last 12 months. The majority use the Shifnal and Priorslee practice, but 58 use the Albrighton practice and 79 the Sutton Hill practice.

Around 1200 respondents had problems in getting a doctor's appointment. One third considered the availability of appointments was inadequate and the telephone appointment system a failure. Nearly 300 people felt that availability of a doctor was the issue, whilst other comments mentioned difficulties caused by the triage system.

Most people would seem willing and able to use Priorslee surgery as well as Shifnal, and the majority would use Saturday or evening surgeries and would find such developments helpful.

The following chart indicates how many people would welcome an NHS dentist in Shifnal.



### **Shopping**

The large majority of respondents indicated that their main shopping was done in Telford, with top-up shopping in Shifnal. There was very little demand for a local delivery service, and little or no enthusiasm for having to pay for such a service.

Many people would support a local Farmers' Market on a monthly basis.

The post office received virtually unanimous support in respect of the threat of closure and is used frequently by a third of respondents and occasionally by the remainder.

### **Environment**


Many of you said that Shifnal should be made more attractive through placing more flower tubs and baskets in the town centre, as well as planting flowers and putting up more attractive signs on the approaches to the town. In particular, over 1000 respondents said that the railway arches should be smartened up. Litter and fly-tipping are seen as problems by most people.









An overwhelming majority of respondents said that the existing Greenbelt around Shifnal should be kept.



Most respondents thought that more recycling facilities are needed, and would like to see the kerbside collection of plastic and cardboard. Additional recycling facilities in the town centre would be welcomed. There is a good awareness of the local furniture collection scheme, but fewer people knew about other recycling services such as Freecycle.



Over 1000 adult respondents said that they would use a new park, with a third of those expecting to use it once a week or more. However, the young people's forums were almost unanimous about the need for a new park. The provision of formal gardens, a toddler play area and a seniors' activity area were all strongly supported, as were facilities like a skateboard park and a kick-about area for young people.




Nearly 900 people considered that more green spaces should be provided for wildlife.


### **Housing and Planning**

Housing and planning are very emotive issues. On the one hand many people feel strongly about how Shifnal should develop. On the other, some have little faith that their opinions will affect the ultimate decisions taken by those in authority. Nearly 93 per cent of respondents felt that the conservation area should be retained, whilst an overwhelming 98 per cent thought future planning developments should take care to preserve the character and appearance of the town.


There was clear support for the creation of more local employment in light industrial, retail, hi-tech, manufacturing and other services although some of the comments mentioned the need to retain Shifnal's character.




From one of the early consultations that took place at the Housing Fair in the summer of 2007, the message 'no more flats' resonated as an ongoing theme. The need for housing for families with three bedrooms or more and gardens was frequently mentioned. According to the 2001 census, Shifnal has a larger proportion of elderly people in the community than the national average. The need for sheltered housing for elderly people was the largest response when asked what housing needs may be in the next five years. Comments received made mention of smaller properties suitable for independent living.



Interestingly, when asked to predict housing needs over the next five to ten years, the responses changed quite markedly with a dramatic increase in requirements for executive housing.



When asked how they felt about more houses being built in Shifnal, 51 per cent said they did not want any more, 24 per cent would welcome limited development, and 16 per cent wanted infill only.



### **Disability issues**

Over 15% of the 1,358 responses to the disability enquiries had disabilities, and over a third of these experience difficulties in accessing services in Shifnal.

The most common complaints were about thoughtless car parking, lack of special disabled car parks, narrow pavements, badly repaired pavements and the need for more pedestrian crossings, particularly for one near the doctors' surgery.

Additional care homes, particularly bungalows, are needed in Shifnal as many infirm and older residents have had to move away.

### **Youth Consultation**

Discussion groups of young people of various ages from Idsall School were held over several days. The focus groups felt that the major environmental issue for Shifnal is the extent and type of housing development in the town itself. Key consequences are the loss of wildlife habitat, the loss of areas for young people to hang out, and that developments are too expensive to provide affordable housing for younger people.



They also feel that although the parks provide for the needs of younger children, they do not have the facilities for teenagers. They commented that the school shuts early but its facilities are too expensive for them to use in any case: however, they were extremely supportive of the planned building of a swimming pool at Idsall.

Skateboarding facilities would be strongly welcomed, and they felt very positive about the planned youth centre/café underneath the railway arches.


The young people felt that the Community Support Officers of West Mercia Police were doing a good job and particularly liked the way they took the time to get to know young people.


They felt that, apart from a Sunday, the transport facilities for Shifnal with both buses and a train service were very good. They would, however, value a transport card which offered all students reduced cost travel on either rail or bus. They felt that there was a significant need for better lighting on the approaches to the railway station.

Although there is some gang culture in Shifnal, there was felt to be little friction between groups. The evening of the Shifnal Carnival is seen as the main source of anti-social behaviour which they feel is caused by people from outside Shifnal.

### **Primary Age Consultation**


Over 300 youngsters aged between 6 and 11 from Shifnal Primary and St Andrew's Schools participated in consultations using pod voting to indicate their preferences. Their choices for what they like doing best, both generally and restricted to Shifnal, can be seen below. (More than half of the category 'Other' was made up of Tennis, Gymnastics and Trampolining). Over half of the youngsters belonged to 2 or more clubs.





Most children felt safe riding their bicycle, and, when walking without an adult, felt least safe on quiet streets. Less than half played on the swings in Shifnal, and most were accompanied to the park and swings by an adult. The preferred places of play were as follows:





When asked about a swimming pool, 80 per cent said that they would use one at least once a fortnight. However, asked if Shifnal were to get one new thing, the popular choice was a Cinema, just ahead of a Swimming Pool.

In response to the question 'Do you think Shifnal is clean and tidy?' over three quarters replied 'No'.

The youngsters from the primary schools also contributed pictures showing what they would like Shifnal to have in ten years' time, and some of these can be seen on the cover of this plan and elsewhere. Common themes revealed that they would like a swimming pool, cycle paths, pet shop, toy shop, skateboard area, park with roller coasters and so on, a cinema, and even a space centre!

### **General Issues**

Whilst there was good support for the benefits of having a leaflet detailing the facilities and services available to Shifnal residents, only a minority would be prepared to pay for it. Similarly, although a Shifnal Community Newsletter would be welcomed very strongly, on a quarterly basis, most people do not wish to see any addition to the Council Tax to pay for it.

Fewer than half of residents would use a Shifnal Community website regularly, and there was little support for the idea of a central place of social gatherings, information, children's and social services etc.

Although most people know that there will be a new Unitary Authority operating from Spring 2009, they do wish to know more about its operation, and also that of the Town Council.

### **Volunteer Responses**

There was an excellent response of almost 320 people who indicated that they would be prepared to assist with possible projects, and who have provided contact details.

### **The Way Forward**

The consultation activities have provided all of us with a much more informed view of those things which concern Shifnal residents, and identified things where people wish to see change and improvement. The associated Shifnal Town Action Plan has summarised areas and projects which are most strongly supported, but many will require commitment from people who can volunteer their time and expertise.

Some significant steps have already been taken as a result of the Town Plan process. Around 300 residents have volunteered to assist with a variety of community initiatives from the carnival to the swimming pool, and from helping with senior citizens' projects to mother and toddler groups. Their names and addresses have been given to local groups and hopefully many are now involved in Shifnal's community life, helping those who give voluntarily of their time to improve things for us all.

As it became clear that improvements to the railway station car park were wanted, links with Shropshire County Council and London Midland transport operator were made. As a result of these meetings, finance has been identified and it is hoped contractors will begin improving the station car park and its approaches.

Funding has been identified to update and print the town tourist brochure which will be disseminated to local tourist board outlets and around the town. An action group has been formed to address the issues related to traffic, transport and pedestrian safety and a teacher has been identified who would be interested in starting painting classes in Shifnal.

### Implementation, Monitoring and the Evaluation of Progress

Shifnal Town Council has adopted this Town Plan and has undertaken to oversee the implementation of the Action Plan. The Town Council will endeavour to encourage all those statutory, private and voluntary sector bodies identified in the plan as being instrumental in its delivery to work on those actions outlined and to continue to work in partnership for the benefit of the community.



The Town Council has identified the Shifnal Town Clerk together with the Town Plan Steering Committee as the main points of contact and as the primary figures in monitoring the progress of the Action Plan. The progress of the Action Plan will be reviewed and monitored at Town Council meetings on a regular basis.

### **Appendices**

### **Consultation Process**

### **Beginnings**

The possibility of a Town Plan for Shifnal was raised at the autumn Let's Talk meetings of both 2005 and 2006. A small group formed after the 2005 meeting to see if a Town Plan for Shifnal could be started. Informal soundings were taken of various stakeholders. A number of Parish Plan Network Events were attended and discussions took place with Shifnal Town Council. In May 2007, Shifnal Town Council confirmed its support for the Town Plan. Right from the start, it was the intention to consult as widely as possible with the overall aim of giving every Shifnal resident, from the very young to the very old, the opportunity to express their view on how Shifnal should develop over the next ten years.

### 5 June 2007

An initial public meeting was called to establish if there was community support for a Town Plan for Shifnal. The meeting was addressed by the then Mayor of Shifnal, Cllr TD Jones, Caroline Oakes, Community Council of Shropshire and George Chancellor, originator of Little Wenlock's Parish Plan. Around 120 people were there, 73 questionnaires were returned, some representing the views of 2 people and 17 left their names and addresses on separate sheets. The questionnaire revealed that 100% of respondents thought it was very important or important that Shifnal should have a Town Plan. It also asked for the three most important areas the Town Plan should address helping to identify some of the core issues that concerned the community. Anyone wishing to be involved was asked to attend the next meeting.

### 19 June 2007

A second public meeting took place for those interested in getting directly involved. Shifnal Town Plan Steering Committee (STPSC) was formed and relevant areas for working groups identified. Anyone interested in helping joined either the STPSC or a working group.

### 10 July 2007

The first committee meeting of the Shifnal Town Plan Steering Committee took place. Various committee members undertook to start forming working groups and initiating the variety of consultations that would take place. From September 2007, committee meetings took place around once a month. The meeting on 11 December 2007 was addressed by Trevor Tarran, Director of Development Services at Bridgnorth District Council.

Eight working groups were formed which met regularly with the aim of identifying what issues were significant and what questions would be put in the Household Questionnaire. Ad hoc sub groups were formed as necessary to work on such matters as editing and printing.

### 22 August 2007

The Town Plan had a stall and exhibition at the Housing Fair, Idsall School, August 2007 which explained the purpose of the Town Plan, how to get involved and requested completion of a questionnaire.



### 4 September 2007

The Town Plan had a table at the Let's Talk Meeting where the questionnaire from the Housing Fair was also distributed and additional volunteers collected.

Early in the process, Shifnal Town Plan website was set up with a Google mail address box for contributions. Successive questionnaires were put on the site for people to print off and complete. Press releases were posted there, and subsequently the results of the Residents' Questionnaire.

### **Continuing Consultation Process**

Working Groups got together on numerous occasions and consulted widely to establish the issues of importance to the local community and the questions that would form the basis of the Residents' Questionnaire which was to go to every house in Shifnal. The Seniors Working Group consulted the Shifnal Medical Practice Manager and the General Manager of the NHS Primary Care Trust.

Publicity in the Shropshire Star alerted the public to the questionnaire and the Shoe Box Suggestion Scheme. Shoe boxes were placed around town allowing people to put in their completed questionnaires or simply drop in their own suggestions. The Shoe Box Suggestion Scheme ran in local shops from August 2007 until January 2008.

Wide consultation with most shop owners and school heads was done by David Dovaston on behalf of the Traffic, Transport and Pedestrian Working Group. Chris Serhan consulted the Live At Home Scheme and produced a detailed report. The working group planning for a Christmas Fair in December 2009 produced a questionnaire from their stall at the Shifnal Christmas Lights.

From 24 October until 10 November 2007, a Town Plan display was mounted in the Library with suggestion cards available for anyone to put down their ideas. The display explained what the Town Plan was, its aims, its working groups, how to get involved and how to put views forward.

Press releases were sent to the Shropshire Star and the Bridgnorth Journal. Radio Shropshire was involved. The local Magazine In and Around Shifnal did a feature and the Parish Magazine publicized events.

During February/March 2008, further consultation took place by Kate and Stephen Grafton in Katrina's asking customers what they thought of the local facilities available in Shifnal.

### April 2008 - The Residents' Questionnaire

The Residents' Questionnaire, based on all the consultation done to date, consisted of 90 questions seeking community views on the issues that had been identified. A Questionnaire was delivered to every household in Shifnal with space for two adults (18+) to complete their views. The views of the young people and children of Shifnal were sought through a major consultation exercise with the youth and a 'pod casting' day in the two primary schools. The closing date for submissions was 1 May 2008.

2888 Questionnaires were delivered. 850 were returned representing the views of 1312 of Shifnal's residents – an overwhelming response and indicative of the desire of the Shifnal community to be involved in its future. The information was collated



and analysed by the Community Council of Shropshire, and quantitative and qualitative reports produced.

### 1 May 2008

This proved an exciting day for all involved in the consultation with Shifnal's younger citizens. Using hand held voting pods which were connected to a computer with overhead display, the children of the two Primary Schools were able to cast their votes in a series of options designed to catch their views on how Shifnal should develop over the next ten years.

### **Youth Consultation**

Over a period of several days, discussions were held with groups of young people of various ages from Idsall School. These focus groups responded to a number of specific issues, raising many significant points in the course of the consultation which have formed part of the Plan.

### 22 July 2008

An exhibition was mounted in Shifnal Village Hall to feed back to the public the results of the Household Questionnaire, the youth consultation and the pod-casting events.

The quantitative results of the Residents' Questionnaire were placed on the website and a hard copy went in to Shifnal Library.

### 5 December 2008

A public drop-in session was organised to present the draft plan to the community, garner the comments and amend as appropriate before publishing. Particular focus was placed on the Action List and the opportunity taken to garner more volunteers.


